


Then...The Entertainment!



Like many great ideas, the idea of having the Mentors take over the Club came more or less by accident. A handful of Mentors have been helping ADS staff run the Club since 2003, but up to now, staff were taking the lead.

In the spring of 2010, the ADS staff decided to change the coffee counter schedule in the Club. We decided that the counter would be closed during off-peak hours. The thinking on our part was that this time would be better served for staff to focus on activities in the club.

These changes were met by a great amount of concern amongst the CHIRS members. Overnight, the suggestion box filled with complaints about the change: "I could always count on a coffee before program", "I just wanted a pop and the club was closed", "...It was one thing in my life that I could count on..." At the next Mentor Meeting, after reviewing the suggestion box, the Mentors brainstormed different ways in which they could help keep the coffee counter open during off-peak hours. After some debate, they proposed to take more shifts and run the counter, keeping it open from 9:30-4:30 all day. These ideas were presented to the ADS team, and accepted.

To the surprise of no one, the Mentors stepped up to the challenge with skill and passion. And, the passion spread as Mentors recruited their peers to join the Mentorship team. Over the next few months, the Mentors demonstrated the skills, dedication and spirit to take the lead in running the club, making it more vibrant, in fact, "the place to be".

In October 2010, the "keys to the club" were passed from the ADS team to the Mentors and the Club was officially re-opened on January 24, 2011. Currently, the Mentor team: runs the coffee counter; prepares lunches; keeps the club space clean and safe; cleans laundry and dishes; helps with shopping. And the Mentors have also started to run activities in the Club, hosting everything from dance lessons to trivia contests and movies. Every day is a new challenge. Every day is a new learning experience. With their energy and vision I can honestly say that I am excited and optimistic about what lies ahead for tomorrow.
